Does your child ride a bike or scooter to school?

The Department of Education and Training and NSW Roads and Traffic Authority recommend that children under 10 years of age DO NOT ride bicycles to and from school unless accompanied by an adult.


Our school bike and scooter policy goes further. Children under 10 years of age are not allowed to ride their bike to school. Children 10 years and older who wish to ride a bike or scooter to school need a school bike licence. Parents and carers have the added responsibility of ensuring their child's bike is safe, well maintained and that a helmet is worn at all times when riding.
